#### Maryknoll Sisters Center News continued.

Sister Betty Ann Maheu celebrated her 96<sup>th</sup> birthday in January as well as her 70<sup>th</sup> Diamond Jubilee on February 10, 2019.

Sister Betty Ann, born in Quebec, Canada, grew up in Maine. Before joining the Maryknoll Congregation in 1949, Sister was a speech and drama instructor in a Quaker School, public high school and Mercyhurst University. She has degrees in Speech and Drama, French and English. Sister has also done graduate studies in Theology, Education Administration, and several languages.

In 1951 her first assignment was to Hawaii. She lived in Hawaii for 18 years, of which, nine years were teaching in Maui, while at the same time, staging plays and musicals to help fund the parish school. She then spent nine years on the island of Oahu as Assistant to the Superintendent of Catholic Schools, and supervisor of Maryknoll's Schools in Hawaii, the Marshall Islands and Yap, Caroline Islands.

On her return in 1970 to the Maryknoll Center Sister was elected to serve on the Congregation's Central Governing Board for eight years from 1971 to 1979.



Sister was asked to join the International Union of Superiors General in 1979. She moved to Rome where she lived until 1985, coordinating and editing the Union's publication journal, "Bulletin" in six languages. Her letters and reports from the Vatican were interesting insights into the workings of the Church as well as glimpses into Sister's work and observations living in Rome.

In 1990 Sister was assigned to teaching in Xiamen Teachers College of Education then on to Hong Kong where she joined and worked as a permanent staff member of the Holy Spirit Center, a China research center in Hong Kong. There she was the English editor of the bilingual journal "Tripod" and a regular contributor to the English "Sunday Examiner," a weekly newspaper. Sister lived and worked in Hong Kong and China for 16 years.

On her return to the Sisters Center, she finished her most recent book, The Maryknoll Sisters, Hong Kong, Macau, China, 1968-2007, documenting the missionary work of all Maryknoll Sisters who had served in the China Region in that period.

Sister Betty Ann contributed to the writing of the opening chapter of Maryknoll Convent School anniversary book Forever Be True, The Love & Heritage of Maryknoll. Her piece started with the questions: Origin & History. Who are the Maryknoll Sisters? Where do they come from? And how did they come to be? In Sister Betty Ann's summary of the Maryknoll Spirit she wrote: "It is a spirit of unity and peace, of solidarity of purpose, of holiness of life, of joy in service, of forgetting of self in seeking the welfare of all. It is a spirit of mutual love and tenderness, a spirit of simplicity and gentleness. It is one that reflects the charity of Christ and is ever open to the griefs, sorrows and joys of others" - the summation and answer of who the Maryknoll Sisters are.

Sister Betty Ann, a Maryknoll historian, teacher, author of several books, play and musical director, fluent in many languages, is a true Renaissance Sister!

Sister Betty Ann is now working at the Maryknoll Sisters Center's Secretariat.

#### News of the passing of our Maryknoll Sisters from the China Missioner Group

**Sister Maria Rieckelman** passed away on December 28, 2018. She was 91 years old and had been a Maryknoll Sister for 73 years. She was born in Cincinnati, Ohio on August 31,1927. She entered Maryknoll in 1945, took her First Profession in 1948 and her Final Vows in 1951.

In 1951 Sister Maria graduated from College of Mount St. Vincent with a Bachelor of Science degree and in 1955 a Doctor of Medicine degree from the Medical College of Wisconsin. She was posted to Korea in 1956 and in 1958 she left for Hong Kong to study Chinese and supervise the building of Our Lady of Maryknoll Hospital (OLMH) in Wong Tai Sin which opened in 1961. From1963 to 67 she served as OLMH Administrator.

She returned to the States to study and received certificates in General Psychiatry in 1970 and Child Psychiatry in 1974, when mental health care was badly needed. In her lifelong work, Sister Maria gave seminars and workshops in the fields of Psychiatric Therapy and Spiritual Psychiatry to missioners and religious leaders of all faiths. She held many positions and was appointed Coordinator of Health Services for the Church in the USA at the US Catholic Conference in Washington, D.C. From 1978 to 2012. Sister Maria retired to Maryknoll Sisters Center in 2012.

**Sister Pauline Sticka** passed away on December 7, 2018 at Maryknoll Sisters Center. She was 94 years old and had been a Maryknoll Sister for 76 years. Sister Pauline had dedicated her life working with the Chinese. Her first assignment was in Southern China where she learned Hakka Chinese, and later, during her more than 40 years in Taiwan, she mastered the local Taiwanese dialect.

Sister Pauline was born on December 9th, 1924 in North Dakota. She entered the Maryknoll congregation in 1942 and made her First Profession in 1945. She was assigned to China in 1947 and took her Final Vows in 1948 in Kaying, China. In 1951, Sister Pauline was expelled from China when the Communists took over, and returned to work in Chicago's Chinatown for three years.

In 1955, after Chicago, Sister Pauline was assigned to Taiwan and worked there until 2007. During her mission work Sister Pauline also took time to study Theology in the Philippines, Community Service in Rogers College at Maryknoll and to further her Theology studies at Maryknoll School of Theology in New York. In 2008, she retired to Maryknoll community in Monrovia, CA and in 2014, returned to Maryknoll Sisters Center.

**Sister Paulita Hoffman**, our eldest Maryknoll Sister at 104 years old, passed away on March 14, 2019. Sister Paulita was born in Cincinnati, Ohio on August 13, 1914.

She knew when she was a teenager that she wanted to be a missionary in China. She joined Maryknoll in 1933 and in 1938 her first assignment was to Southern China where she learned to speak Hakka. In 1949 during the Communist takeover, she and her companion Sister Edith Rietz were placed under house arrest then imprisoned by the Communist government, accused of being American spies. They were mistreated in prison and finally released to Hong Kong in 1951. After a few years back in Maryknoll, she regained her health and set off to Taiwan where she worked for over 40 years.

She returned to Maryknoll Sisters Center in 2004. In honor of her dedicated service to the people of Taiwan, Sister Paulita was granted by the Taiwanese government permanent Taiwanese citizenship before she left.

She retired in 2012 but always kept herself busy helping out at the Center in any way she could even when her eyesight was failing.

I had the good fortune to have met Sister Paulita in 2012 when my class held our mini reunion at the Sisters Center. I was fascinated by this very petite Sister with a big personality and many stories to tell about her adventures and work in China and Taiwan.

The most touching story she told was about her dog Skippy who accompanied her to church every morning before school when she was just a teenager. At first her mother wouldn't approve as the church was far away and she needed to take a bus in the dark. Sister convinced her mom that she would be safe if she took her dog Skippy with her and her mother finally gave in. She was very sad to leave Skippy behind when she left home to join Maryknoll. The bond she developed with Skippy lasted all her life. When she retired in Maryknoll, in memory of her Skippy, she named her walker Skippy -- see note pinned on her walker in photo -- her companion from childhood.

Election to the National Academy of Engineering is among the highest professional distinctions accorded to an engineer. Academy membership honors those who have made outstanding contributions to "engineering research, practice, or education, including, where appropriate, significant contributions to the engineering literature" and to "the pioneering of new and developing fields of technology, making major advancements in traditional fields of engineering, or developing/implementing innovative approaches to engineering education."


Individuals in the newly elected class will be formally inducted during a ceremony at the NAE's annual meeting in Washington, D.C., on Oct. 6, 2019.

She joined the faculty of Computer Science at Stanford University in 1988. She has contributed to the research of a wide range of computer systems topics Including compilers, program analysis, operating systems, security, computer architecture, and high-performance computing. She currently directs the MobiSocial laboratory at Stanford.

#### Maria CH Lin, MCS Class of '59

I was born in Kunming, Yunnan and when I was five years old, my family moved to Shanghai. In 1949, we went to Hong Kong as refugees. I became a Maryknoller in 1951 and graduated in 1959. I worked for two years, one of which was as a lab assistant in 1961 in Sr. Jeanne's Domestic Science Lab and in the Biology Lab.

Then, I went to Mt. St. Vincent in New York for a BS in Chemistry, then went onto University of Kansas for a Master degree in Chemistry.

After which, I went to work for DuPont. In 1968, I was married to Robert Lin. In 1971, I resigned from DuPont and went on to Ciba Geigy to work as a Research Scientist. In 1974, I attended Fordham Law School and became an Intellectual Property Lawyer in 1978. I worked as an IP lawyer for almost thirty years. During which, I became known as an expert on

China heading the Committee on China in the NY IP Law Association, the American IP Law Association and the president of the Patent Law Club for corporate counsels. I loved my work and enjoyed it greatly. I became a partner of Morgan & Finnegan. In 2005, I came to Shanghai to head up the firm of Morgan & Finnegan. In 2008, because of the economic crisis, I retired.

My husband Robert passed away in 1992. I have been a widow for the last 27 years. For family reasons, I have stayed in Shanghai. Up to now, I have resided in Shanghai for 13 years.

I have stayed connected to Maryknoll through my classmates and friends. In 2004, we formed the NY alumni association headed by Emily Ting, Class of 1953 and organized the worldwide reunion. It has been wonderful to learn that teamwork and collaboration led to our success.

The class of '59 is still quite active. We will have a reunion cruise to Vietnam in November to commemorate our sixtieth anniversary.



Mother Mary Joseph bid them farewell and said, "Let us see what God has in store for us!" not anticipating that they would land in a strange and foreign land, not knowing the language and culture. They found themselves in the midst of a civil war, having to deal with warlords, bandits and pirates on their way to evangelize among village women. Despite encountering political uncertainties, cultural differences and much physical hardships, the Sisters were fearless in face of atrocities, arrests, house detentions and starvation. Their courage and bravery won over many villagers.

Their missions were so successful that they ventured further to South America and Africa after China. The Sisters fought for justice where there was injustice and built schools and hospitals for the poor and suffering.

This book reads like a history, thriller, adventure, biography, travelogue ... many genres all rolled into one. Archbishop Emeritus Desmond Tutu wrote in the foreword: "Penny Lernoux's riveting account of the courageous lives of the Maryknoll Sisters makes me proud to be a Christian." Having been a student of the Maryknoll Sisters and having seen how their life's work has made this a better world, makes me proud to be a Maryknoller!
