SISTER SUE RECH HELPS WOMEN IN TANZANIA ACHIEVE INDEPENDENCE AND FOOD SECURITY

It's almost a universal rule that wherever there is poverty, insecurity or injustice, women will suffer. That's why Maryknoll Sisters on mission always make a special effort to see that women, and the children who depend upon them, have extra support.

In Tanzania, in East Africa, **Sister Sue Rech, MM** works with a group that helps promote food and land security, holistic development, and social justice among these pastoral people, especially the women. As in so many societies, Maasai women traditionally depend upon their husbands for their livelihoods.

Sister Sue's group works to build food security through a "Share a Goat" program, and helps women to achieve financial independence through education, land titling, and training and loans to promote entrepreneurship. Sister's team helps the Maasai procure livestock, building materials and other equipment as well as the tools for education and training.

SISTER JUDITH NOONE WORKS TO EMPOWER WOMEN IN GUATEMALA

One of the main focuses of Maryknoll Sisters ministries is providing support for women and girls. They face many challenges and barriers because of their gender, and this can be especially true in the developing world, where economic competition and traditional gender roles are stronger.

In the Central American nation of Guatemala, **Sister Judith Noone**, **MM** works to empower women through education, communitybuilding, food support, and holistic healing practices.

"What we do is analyze," she says. "It's all based on conversation. What is your life like? We talk about the empowerment of women, domestic violence... there's a wide variety of themes. Whatever they're most interested in."

SISTER ISABEL da COSTA ARAUJO HELPS PEOPLE IN BRAZIL OPEN DOORS THROUGH LITERACY

The Maryknoll Sisters' mission of making God's love visible means bringing the gifts of food, healthcare, housing, advocacy, and education to people that would otherwise be left to suffer on their own. But it also means being there for them with comfort, friendship, and understanding.

Sister Isabel da Costa Araujo, MM says, "I have a dream of helping the children whose parents are absent or not able to support them. I want to help take care of their basic spiritual, mental and economic needs and help them grow into people ready face the future."

Sister Isabel works in the port city of João Pessoa, near the country's easternmost tip. She works in a program called Afya, which is the Swahili word for "health." "I work with the women in the kitchen and teach arts and crafts to some of the children," she says. "I also teach reading and writing to women in Afya and children in our neighborhood."

Basic literacy is a key that opens countless doors. In a place like Brazil, where many poor people have no access to education, being able to read and write is a tremendous advantage not only for the individual, but for their family and community as well.

Sister's ministry, in true Maryknoll tradition, consists of doing what is needed to help people see the love of God in their lives. This also includes cooking in the Afya kitchen, visiting children in orphanages and the elderly at home and in shelters, and comforting the sick, dying and bereaved.

"Our supporters may have never been in the missions, but they are the heart of God," she says. "They give, they support us in mission and make everything we do possible. I'm just grateful for them and I pray for them and their families too."

SISTER ANNA MANAUIS KEEPS PEOPLE FED AND HEALTHY IN PERU

Sister Anna Manauis, MM works in the impoverished suburbs of Lima, Peru. The effects of the Covid-19 pandemic have been devastating there, among people who were already barely living at a survival level.

To help reduce the suffering in her area, Sister Anna helped a group of local women start a soup kitchen called *Olla Común* ("Common Pot"). It provides meals to local people who would otherwise not be able to feed their families due to the loss of their meager income. Good nutrition is, of course, key to being healthy enough to resist disease during a pandemic.

"Most of the adult people here either work on a part time basis or are daily wage earners working as peddlers, household and market helpers, laborers, etc. There are also a lot of single parents and elderly folks in this zone. The lockdown and obligatory quarantine left many without jobs, and so their families are also left without any resources to provide for food, medicines, and other medical needs."

The difficult and often dangerous projects these Sisters undertake all around the world continue to amaze and inspire me – specifically Sister Mary Vertucci and her



work in Tanzania educating very young girls who were at risk of being sold into marriage by fathers and uncles. These girls will now have a chance at a future that they decide. Maryknoll sisters demonstrate the true hands and heart of Jesus."

The Maryknoll Sisters Path to Mission project is to recognize our donors, whose support has made our mission work possible. The Path is meant to provide a place for prayer, meditation, reflection, healing and thanksgiving.



Many of our supporters are looking for ways to make a major, impactful gift to Maryknoll Sisters ministries. We want to make sure that this can be done without causing financial hardship for the donor...and in some cases, even providing benefits.

Below, we present some options for giving that you may wish to consider.

- DONOR ADVISED FUND. This option allows you to create a fund dedicated to making charitable gifts, *for which you can take an immediate tax deduction*. Any growth of the fund through investment is also tax-free. You can then recommend, at any time, that an amount of money from your fund be donated to a qualified charity of your choice, such as the Maryknoll Sisters.
- INDIVIDUAL RETIREMENT ACCOUNT (IRA). You can realize tax advantages by giving directly to the Maryknoll Sisters from your IRA. Qualified Charitable Donations (QCD) through your IRA have a maximum annual amount of \$100,000 per individual. (If you file taxes jointly, the maximum is \$200,000.) The Required Mandatory Distribution (RMD) can also be directed to Maryknoll Sisters to satisfy the distribution mandate while reducing your tax liability. <u>The</u> <u>requirements to receive these tax benefits are not complicated</u>. Your financial planner or accountant can assist you in making your gift to the greatest advantage.
- A BEQUEST IN YOUR WILL. By leaving an amount in your will (after your other heirs have been provided for), you can make a potentially large gift while assuring that the money will still be available if you ever need it. You can choose to leave a specific amount, a percentage of your estate, or the remainder after all your other bequests have been made.




