


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MESSAGE President

HELPING OPEN THE DOOR OF EDUCATION IN Bangladesh

With your help, the school is having a significant and positive impact on lives in Bangladesh! God bless you for your kindness, generosity, and willingness to help create the 'ripples of good' that will change the world.

BACHA—Bangladesh Alternative Course for Human

Advancement—is the name of an extraordinary school in Dhaka, Bangladesh. The school was founded in the early 2000s by the late Sister Joan Westhues, MM and Sister Miriam Francis Perlewitz, MM, who still works as an advisor and mentor at BACHA today.

The school grew out of a Values program the Sisters had created called "*Education for Life*." This program aimed to prevent drug use among high school students—especially girls, since there were no drug rehab facilities for women in the region.

Unlike the system of rote learning that is prevalent in most Bangladeshi schools, **BACHA teaches students to think and discover for themselves, using their intelligence and creativity in a values-driven setting.**





"When we opened the school in 2001," Sister Miriam recalls, "it was possibly the only liberal arts English-medium school in Bangladesh. Sister Joan and I both taught and worked to train new teachers. We've had the most success finding candidates from our own students and graduates."

The idea of the "ripple effect" is central to the Maryknoll Sisters' practice of maximizing the effects of the work they do with the funds they have. Education is one of the best ways to accomplish this. Educated people can not only improve their own living conditions and those of their families, but they can also pass on their knowledge to others. BACHA now has about 900 students from Nursery to Grade 12 levels.

PROMOTING HEALTH AND WHOLENESS OF BEING IN Panama

The transformative work of Sister Jocelyn and her colleagues is possible thanks to the generosity of caring people like you. Your generous support makes you her partner in mission, enabling her and her colleagues to share God's healing love with those most in need.

Sister Jocelyn Finix, MM

When **Sister Jocelyn "Joji" Fenix, MM** arrived in the province of Darién in the Central American nation of Panama, she found people suffering from the problems so common in the developing world—poverty, exploitation, indifference by those in power. The people were worn down by hunger, sickness, unemployment, and a loss of hope.

Sister Jocelyn is a medical doctor, and one of her first ministries was to see to the health of the people, many of whom are migrant farmers and few of whom have easy access to basic health care. Her work extends far beyond the examination room, however. Sister has introduced the people in her community to a holistic approach to health.

"I am primarily involved in health promotion through practicing alternative forms of health care, including Ayurvedic medicine, use of herbal medicinal plants, reflexology and massage. I promote healthy





diets and organic vegetable gardens, and the raising and consumption of goat's milk, free range chicken, cheese, etc."

To help promote and carry out her efforts, Sister Jocelyn has recruited and helped to train Health Promoters—local people who can both assist with providing health care, and spread the word that it is available.

Rebirth and renewal are key themes of Sister Jocelyn's ministry. This is also seen in the work that she and the local people do to restore the local rainforests and plant life, which have been impacted by over-logging, over-development and climate change. The Pastoral Care Center maintains a farm that preserves almost 100 acres of native rainforest, and a seedling bank to preserve and restore local trees, flowers, and plants.

Imagine living in such fear and uncertainty that you're willing to leave everything you know based on the word of a stranger who promises you stability and security, for you and maybe for your children. Then imagine traveling, full of hope, to a place you've never been, only to end up exploited and poor—a financial or even physical captive. Promises broken. Dreams destroyed.

This is the evil of human trafficking, and every year millions of people fall victim to it. Most are women, but this abomination affects children and men as well.

In Japan, where labor exploitation is the main issue, **Sister Abby Avelino**, **MM** established a regional Talitha Kum network, which is an international network that combats human trafficking.

"My ministry is mainly with migrants, women and children in Japan, and migrants are very vulnerable when it comes to trafficking, sexual exploitation and labor exploitation," Sister Abby explains. "They'll come to us to seek help, especially for shelter, accompaniment, support, counseling and legal and financial assistance."

Sister Abby's work is difficult and often risky. "With its high profile and visibility, Talitha Kum has been able to make these situations less dangerous. Less fear of retribution means trafficked women are more likely to seek help, and that help will be easier to provide."

ADVOCATING FOR JUSTICE IN New Mexico

I am profoundly grateful for the ever-faithful family members, friends, and Maryknoll Sisters sponsors who accompany me with their prayer and generosity. I hold them in my heart and in daily prayer for abundant blessings.

Sister Rose Marie Cecchini, MM

Maryknoll Sisters serve as stewards of the garden God gave us. We strive to tend to the Earth and our brothers and sisters, pulling the weeds of injustice, and sowing seeds of healing and hope, wherever we can.

One such "gardener" is **Sister Rose Marie Cecchini, MM**. She views Mission as "responding to calls beyond known horizons." This commitment has carried her to her current mission in Gallup, New Mexico. Many of the Native American communities who live in that region are suffering the effects of past uranium mining and atomic testing on their land.

"They have revealed to me their deep love for Mother Earth and shown me how to participate in its healing by changing our human life patterns that threaten living systems," Sister Rose Marie says.

When God's creation hurts, so do God's people. Sister Rose Marie understands the consequences of contaminated soil, water, and





air that contribute to cancer and other illnesses for generations of those who live nearby. These communities also face extreme poverty, racism, and other injustices.

Sister works with indigenous environmental justice groups and participates in annual events and collaborates with other organizations and faith communities in "prayer for the healing of ourselves and all of the human family—that we might learn what it means to care for and live in harmony with all of God's creation for present and future generations."

In addition to environmental activism and advocacy, Sister Rose Marie is a founder of Gallup Solar, a program that provides solar power for those in need, especially the thousands of Navajo families without electricity.

HELPING ORPHAN CHILDREN IN Janzania

Maryknoll Sisters like Sister Felista, witnessing to a One Earth Community, are eager to do what they can to help make God's Love Visible. One thing they all have in common is that they could do nothing without support from generous, kind people like YOU.

Sister Felista Wanzagi, MM

In Tanzania, **Sister Felista Wanzagi, MM** is blessed with the opportunity to help the children of her homeland escape lives of poverty and live the futures that God has in store for them.

Sister works with the Chanua Children's Group, a group of several dozen orphan children in the Mwanza Region. In addition to being without their parents, many of these children have AIDS or are HIV+, and have very few resources that they can turn to.

"We help with school materials, getting access to health facilities, food, transportation and tuition. Our goal is to teach the children that all people, including them, are valued and have a place in the world. We give them life skills training and encourage children in the Group to help each other."





Sister Felista and her colleagues work closely with the schools the children are attending and with local offices and community leaders. They consult regularly with teachers, religious leaders and the local population. The children are provided with extra education, physical and spiritual exercises, and entertainment to help relieve the great stress they are under in their daily lives. Special attention is paid to the children's medical conditions, their studies, and their lives with their families and in the community.

The children Sister Felista works with could certainly tell you that those are not just empty words... many of them would not survive without your help, and many of them would live their lives without ever seeing or knowing about God's love for them.

MISSION: A WAY OF LIFE

Monrovia, California is home to a Maryknoll Sisters retirement home, located in a former hospital operated by the Sisters. It is also in the epicenter of the severe drought that has affected the southwestern U.S. in recent years.

In keeping with their commitment to environmental responsibility, the Sisters recently decided to remove six acres of grass and replace it with sheet mulch, also known as "lasagna mulch." The mulch is made from cardboard and wood chips, and is so called because it is set down in layers, like lasagna.

The mulch has the effect of renewing the soil by enabling it to hold more water, and attracting beneficial things like fungi and earthworms. The land can then be used to grow vegetables, flowers, or even trees using significantly less water than the grass did.

Sister Arlene Trant, MM is the coordinator of the retirement home. "The cry for healing is something we are responding to," she says. "This was dry before, but because we did the mulching, it has turned into soil. So it's bringing forth what we wanted it to, and doing what grass could never do: keep the ground moist."

This project is the first of a series of environmentally friendly projects the Sisters plan to undertake with their 20,000 square feet of land. "We are hoping to expand later, step by step, and continue this energy," said Sister Arlene.

Sister Connie Krautkremer, MM's dedicated journey of compassion has spanned continents over the past five decades. For over forty years she spent time immersing herself in the culture of Tanzania as a school teacher and group leader, working with women to enhance their self-awareness and empowerment skills. However, Sister Connie's most recent mission keeps her

closer to the women of Maryknoll, right here in the Center. As director of the personnel department, she remains a guiding light for Sisters who are living in the Center, as well as those out embarking on their first missions. "I'm getting to know each one of these people at a much deeper level," she says. "And that is a gift." Sister Connie's dedication to empowering women and nurturing the growth of her fellow Sisters is a true testament to the Maryknoll Sisters way of life.



Sister Ro Milazzo, MM, with her indomitable spirit, has chosen a life dedicated to selfless service and compassion. Although retired, Sister Ro makes efforts to impact her permanent residence in Ossining, New York by immersing herself in volunteer work. Weekly, she visits soup kitchens and a women's prison, and teaches English as a second language. Her warm smile and gentle words of encouragement offer comfort to

those who cross her path and are in need of uplifting. "I used to go to Iraq, or Congo," Sister Ro said. "Now that I'm 91 and living in this area, it feels to me that this is the place that nourishes me. I'd like them to know Maryknoll." Her continuous drive to Make God's Love Visible provides a glimmer of hope to those throughout Ossining and proves that for the Maryknoll Sisters, mission is truly a way of life.



In 2022, our Sisters had a very special peace ceremony.


