Message from the President

Dear Friends and Benefactors,

I hope this message finds you well and feeling the deep peace that comes from knowing you are part of something meaningful and enduring.

Here at Maryknoll, we've been on a journey of reflection and renewal, asking ourselves how we can best live out our mission in today's world.

Mother Mary Joseph once said that our lives should be marked so clearly by our vocation that no one may take us for anything but missioners. That call remains at the heart of who we are, but as the world changes, so must the ways we carry that mission forward.

One of the beautiful expressions of that transformation is unfolding in Monrovia, California. On our beloved seven-acre property there, we are developing **EARTH Commons**, a space rooted in healing, creativity, and care for our common home. EARTH stands for **Earth**, **Arts**, **Regenerative**, **Transformative**, and **Healing**. We envision it as a place where people from all walks of life can come together to learn, grow, and find renewal. We are working closely with an architectural firm that shares our commitment to sustainability and reverence for the land, reusing what we can and building with purpose.

At our Center in New York, we have also begun renovations on our Main Building, which will one day become home to all of us still living and working here. This is part of our effort to live more simply and intentionally, while preparing for the future. As we move forward, we are exploring how we might share other parts of our campus, like the Cloister and the Chalet, with organizations whose values align with our mission. The Rogers Building will continue to house Sisters for the next few years until the transition is complete.

This year also brought moments of heartfelt change. We closed our missions in Cambodia and the Western United States, and welcomed six Sisters back to Maryknoll. Though our physical presence in those places has ended, the love and care our Sisters shared will live on in the hearts of those they served.

And through it all, you have been with us. Your prayers, your generosity, your belief in our mission—these are the quiet miracles that make everything we do possible. We are so grateful. **Truly, we could not do any of this without you.**

As we continue into the future, please know that you remain in our prayers and in our hearts. Thank you for walking this journey with us.

Stories from the Missions

In the pages that follow, you can read stories about some of our Sisters who are working in locations around the world, being pilgrims of hope to people who may have trouble seeing God's love at work in their lives.

Sister Sue Rech, MMTanzania



Sister Sue has worked for many years among the Maasai people in and around the city of Arusha, in the northern part of the East African nation of Tanzania. She has been especially concerned with making life better for the women of that community, who are often abused or mistreated by their husbands, and often left to fend for themselves and their children.

With Sisters Sue's advice and assistance, thirteen women from the area formed a group called *Upendo* (Swahili for "love") as a mutual support team. They were able to get a multi-partner fund (MPF) loan to help them launch and develop their own small businesses.

Each member received a loan of several hundred dollars from Upendo, which they are expected to pay back on schedule, so the money can then be used to help another member in need. **It's amazing how much these women**

were then able to accomplish when given this one chance!

When these women have better lives, so do their families. When more families have better lives, so does the community. And when the standard of living improves in a community, it makes possible even better things to follow!

Sister Isabel Araujo, MM-

Brazil



One key that opens countless doors to people's potential is basic literacy. In Brazil's port city of João Pessoa, Sister Isabel helps children and adults learn to read and write. In a place where many poor people have no access to education, literacy brings tremendous advantages for the individual, their family, and their community.

Sister Isabel met a young girl named Bruna Beatris, asked her if she attended school, and received a resounding "Yes!" When asked if she could read and write, Bruna said "not yet."

Sister Isabel could sense Bruna's enthusiasm for learning. When she offered to teach her, Bruna enthusiastically said, "YES!"

"We started class with Bruna and her siblings in their house the next day," Sister Isabel said. "The children were so happy that Bruna asked me if she could invite some friends to join our class, and I said yes!" Now Bruna and some of her friends can read and write. One afternoon, Vera Lucy, the grandmother of Bruna's friend Geovanna, called Sister Isabel to say, "Thank you for helping my granddaughter; now she can read and write!" Then she asked a wonderful and unexpected question: "I would like to learn to read and write too. Could you help me?"

Sister Isabel enjoys teaching the children and some adults with love, and hopes they can improve their reading and writing skills. "I hope this simple act of help will lead the children to their bright future and the adults to better communication in society and their families," she added.

Like all Maryknoll Sisters, Sister Isabel's willingness to say YES and provide life-changing literacy lessons to Bruna, her friends, and their families is a lasting gift that will improve their lives.

Sister Elsie Monge, MM-

Ecuador



Sister Elsie's way of making God's Love Visible in our One Earth Community is to help people in her native Ecuador find truth and justice.

The primarily Black *campesinos* she fights for are laborers living on farms belonging to the Furukawa Plantations Company. The company makes millions producing abaca, a robust fiber used for specialty papers, and exporting it to Japan, the Philippines, and other countries. Hundreds of families with no other options work at low wages on the farms and live in extreme poverty. They lack basic, essential services such as clean water and toilet facilities, healthcare or education. There is no assistance for those who are injured on the job.

When some workers asked Furukawa for a living wage, they were fired and forced to leave the only home they'd known. With nowhere to go, they approached Sister Elsie and her colleagues for help. In addition to bringing this appalling situation to the attention of Ecuador's Congress and different government ministries, they organized press conferences and radio interviews with the *campesinos* about the violations, which elevated their situation and experiences onto

the international stage.

"People from the developed world need to reach out their hands to the developing world to empower those people to stand up for themselves and become architects of their destiny," Sister Elsie says.

She finds it gratifying to see how much the *campesinos* have grown together amid so much hardship. One leader told her, "We are not the same; we are different people now. Before, we did not even know the word 'rights' existed!"

"I'm grateful for our benefactors who help us bring hope and transformation to the *campesinos* daily," Sister Elsie says. "There is no greater joy than witnessing someone shed their oppression and become the architects of their destiny." **Thank you, always, for your generosity and caring!**

Rogers Library: A Vibrant Heart of Maryknoll

Tucked into the heart of Maryknoll, the Rogers Library is a stunning architectural gem, a peaceful quadrangle affectionately described by Sister Pat Noble, MM, as "a hole in a doughnut."

This cherished space has taken on a new life of its own thanks to the vision and leadership of our Sister Rosalva Sandi, MM. After completing her mission in East Timor, she returned to the Maryknoll Motherhouse in Ossining, NY to reimagine and oversee the transformation of the library.

Designed to reflect both our physical environment and our spiritual mission, the library's lower level opens to nature, while its upper level embraces the ever-evolving mission of the Maryknoll Sisters. Once a global center for mission knowledge, Rogers Library now serves as a vibrant community hub, nurturing reading, cultural awareness, and inclusivity, all guided by its new mission: "The Rogers Library connects and inspires our community to be inclusive and diverse."

Among its many initiatives, the library is enhancing accessibility between levels and supporting staff development through programs like English as a Second Language (ESL). Originally founded by Sister Helen Phillips, MM, and paused during the pandemic and following her passing, the program was joyfully revived in January 2024 under the guidance of Sister Anne Reusch, MM. It now offers English conversation, reading, and writing classes to Spanish-speaking staff. In its first year back, seven women from housekeeping and the kitchen participated in twice-weekly sessions—five of them during lunch breaks. One woman joined weekly for advanced

writing, and a staff member from the physical plant attended reading skills sessions. The former Librarian's office has been transformed into a dedicated ESL resource room, while classes take place in the library's lower level.

Beyond its educational role, the Rogers Library also fosters connection through its cozy Coffee Shop, where Sisters, staff, and guests come together over warm drinks and shared stories. Nearby, intricate puzzles worked on by the Sisters reflect their enduring sharpness and camaraderie.

Rooted in a commitment to peace, justice, and inclusivity, the Rogers Library continues to thrive as a dynamic gathering place, a symbol of growth, connection, and community, all made possible by your generous support.


Pilgrims of Hope

Sisters in Their Own Words

Sister Rolande Kahindo, MM

Q: Why did you become a Maryknoll Sister?

A: Because I loved the Maryknoll missionary spirit, translated into their readiness to go to other cultures to serve, to learn and to love.



A: I am proud to be a Maryknoll Sister, because I always feel I am one of Jesus' disciples whom he commanded to go to the whole world and proclaim the good news, without distinction of culture or race or nation. I am happy to be part of this mission.

Q: What does "One Earth Community" mean to you?

A: It is our interconnectedness, as human beings and with other living creatures. It is feeling one with other beings in one common home: Earth.

Q: What is your current mission?

A: I am currently in East Timor, a green and mountainous place. I love the place, and the people too. They are quite welcoming to foreigners and mostly to religious sisters. I am involved mostly in three activities. I teach English to high school students between 15 and 16 years of age. I train women and girls for sewing, crochet and knitting, both at home and in school, as an extracurricular activity. In our parish, I accompany a prayer group, the Divine Mercy group. We pray together, do charity work, and make home visits.

Q: Why did you become a Maryknoll Sister?

A: With so much of life, the call to be a Maryknoll Sister was a blend of wanting to be of service to others and the guidance of the Spirit to respond. What I do know with great assurance is that the model of service and response to the needs of others came from my parents. In so many ways they



reached out to others in need and when you see that in action it grows within you.

Q: What do you love most about being a Maryknoll Sister?

A: The gift of community, living and growing with my Maryknoll Sisters and those with whom I served in Mission. I was blessed to be with the people of Cambodia for 23 years. Together we worked to create new opportunities for their children's education, a truly Life-giving experience for all of us that will ripple over and over again into the future.

Q: What does "One Earth Community" mean to you?

A: One Earth Community evokes the absolute oneness of all of our loving God's ongoing Creation. It demands a reverence of all life, for all peoples and all creatures. It calls us each day to have care, concern and love for each living creature enabling all to have a life lived with dignity. It means all are welcome, all deserve LIFE to the fullest.

Q: What is your current mission?

A: I am currently the Coordinator for the Senior Sisters at our Maryknoll Sisters Center. Our Sisters are the living history of our community, each one a special blessing to be cherished and celebrated.

Giving

PLANNED AND LEGACY GIVING

Many of our supporters are looking for ways to make a major, impactful gift to Maryknoll Sisters ministries. We want to make sure that this can be done without causing financial hardship for the donor...and in some cases, even providing benefits.

Below, we present some options for giving that you may wish to consider.

Donor Advised Fund

A Donor Advised Fund is an account that is created and managed for the purpose of making charitable contributions. A charitable income tax deduction is allowed when the fund is established and additional gifts to the fund are made. Charitable gifts are made to qualified charitable organizations as directed by the donor.

Giving From An IRA

Tax laws allow a person at least 70 ½ years of age to make charitable gifts up to \$100,000 from their IRA account. There is no income tax due when

making this type of gift. There is no additional charitable tax deduction.

A Gift Of Stocks

Using long-term (held longer than one year) appreciated stocks is the most economical way to give. A donor is entitled to a charitable income tax deduction for the full fair market value of the securities up to 30% of the adjusted gross income. Excess deductions can be carried forward up to five additional tax years. You also avoid paying any capital gains tax on the appreciation. Please go to our website for additional information.

Charitable Gift Annuities

Many of our donors are continually searching for new methods of planned giving. A charitable gift annuity with Maryknoll Sisters becomes an attractive way to fund a gift. A charitable gift annuity can provide economic benefits to the donor and in turn will help ensure the mission of the Maryknoll Sisters.

A charitable gift annuity is an irrevocable contract between you and the Maryknoll Sisters. You transfer cash or other assets, such

as securities, to us in exchange for guaranteed regular payments for life. The amount of each payment is determined by your age when the annuity is initially funded. (Refer to our website for gift annuity rates.) Married couples often choose to have two annuitants so both will enjoy payments for life. There is no limit to the number of annuities you can fund.

Cryptocurrency

Maryknoll Sisters have partnered with TheGivingBlock.com to ensure your safety, security and convenience. Donating a noncash asset like cryptocurrency is one of the most tax-efficient ways to support the important mission of the Maryknoll Sisters. Similarly to donating stocks, the simple process of donating in cryptocurrencies is beneficial to you and the Sisters! The gift is tax deductible at the full market value, but you owe no taxes on the assets you donate. We accept donations in Bitcoin, Ethereum, and over 80 additional leading cryptocurrencies. A Bequest Or Living Trust

A bequest is a gift made through your will which takes effect at the time of your death. You can make a bequest to the Maryknoll Sisters in the form of a fixed amount, a percentage of your estate, or the remainder which represents the balance of your estate after all of the other bequests have been satisfied.

A revocable living trust is created during one's life. Legal title of the assets is transferred to a trustee to manage the assets until the trust is terminated. This usually occurs at the death of the grantor (person creating the trust). When the trust terminates, the named beneficiaries receive their distributions. Using a revocable trust gives a person flexibility in estate planning and trust assets are not subject to probate.








2024 Financial Report
