Dear Friends and Benefactors,

Greetings from our mission center at Maryknoll. Our **hope** is that, in these times of ambiguity and strife, you are engaged in joyful life events and meaningful adventures.

The year 2025, like the year before, was marked by our journey of transformation. Maryknoll Sisters embrace mission as **relationship** with the people of God, inclusive of all God's creation. As missionaries, we are transformed as we reach out to those on the margins of life who are in most need of **transformation** in God.

EARTH Commons, our mission presence in Monrovia, California is taking shape, as we have engaged many individuals and groups that come to the place looking for rest, prayer, trauma healing, and learning how to care for fruit trees. a housing agency to take operational control of the building. In the future we hope the Cloister and the Chalet will provide more families with a home.

With open arms we welcomed back to the Center several Sisters who had been residing and ministering in the local area, our Eastern U.S. community. These Sisters are now thriving and contributing to our Center life. As our Mission Center community grows, we are strategically organizing our global mission presence "to think globally and act locally." As we are all part of One Earth Community, we want to respond to the world crises in a comprehensive way, while acting directly in our local missions.

Continue with us on our journey as we transform our mission presence in the world and here in New York to be a beacon of Hope, to build Relationships, and Transform ourselves and others across the globe. It takes all of us to participate in God's mission, and you are an integral part of that "us."

Please know that you are always in our prayers and in our hearts. Thank you for being on this journey with us.

Stories from the Missions

The following pages present stories about a few of our Maryknoll Sisters who are working in mission locations around the world, embodying Faith in Action and making God's Love Visible to the people they serve.

Sister Chiyong Pak, MM— *Zimbabwe*



Sister Chiyong Pak has worked in youth and educational ministry in Zimbabwe since 1999. Students there face economic hardships, lack of resources, and political instability that hinder their ability to attend school. Among them, Sister Chiyong is known by the nickname “Sister Chiedza”—*chiedza* being a Shona word meaning light or brightness. This is not just because of her bright personality, but because of the light of caring she brings to the township of Norton, where she is based.

In 2002, she founded the Norton Youth Center with about 10 young students. The Center provided instruction and exposure in a variety of classes such as theater, music, art, dance, sports, and HIV/AIDS prevention and counseling. It also provided tutoring in various academic subjects. Within ten years, the

number of those served grew from 10 to 1,000.

In 2012, the Center lost access to the space they were using. “I can’t forget the disappointed look on their faces when we closed our center,” Sister Chiyong said. Even without a permanent space, though, the Norton Youth Center did not stop its work. In 2015 it received recognition as an NGO and began expanding its service to adults as well as children. Most of the classes had to be held outdoors, even in poor weather.

Then, in 2023, a breakthrough occurred. “September 28, 2023 is a day I will never forget,” Sister Chiyong says happily. “After 16 years, we finally found a place, a block of five rooms to rent as our center!” The Center has also acquired some laptop computers to be used by two groups of students: young people and older adults.

“I am grateful to witness students who came out of our children’s center now rejoining our Center as grown-up mothers and fathers, even grandparents. It is really a complete circle of life.”

All of this is possible only because of the generosity of friends like you. **Thank you for helping these students and older adults have a future and a hope. Truly, God is working through you!**



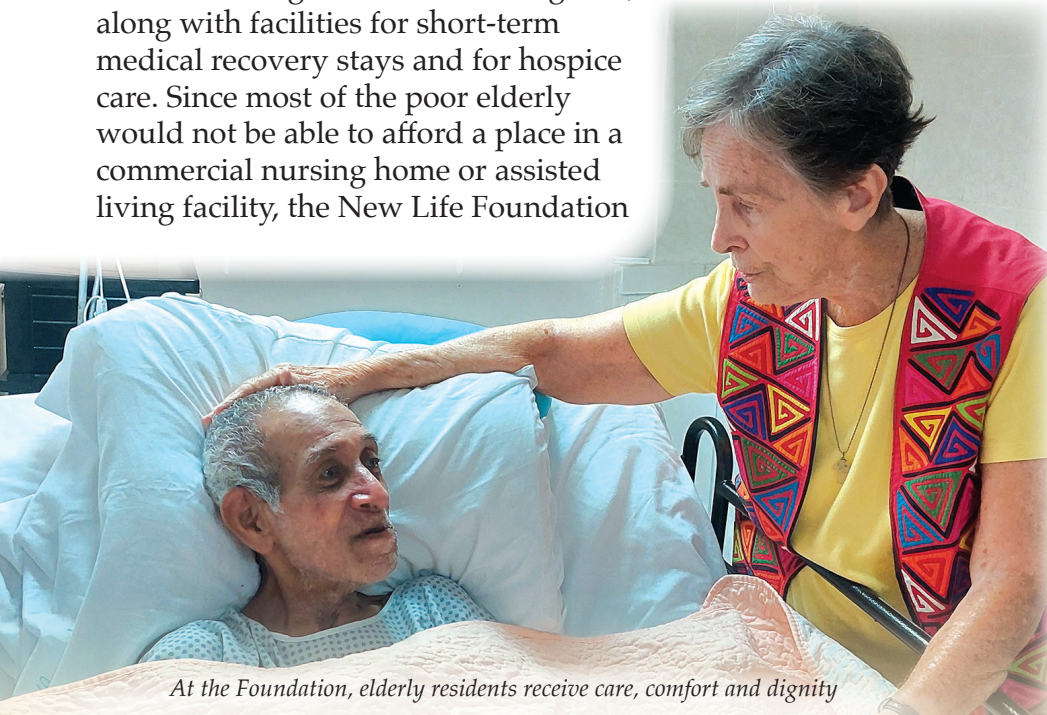

Sister Gerri Brake, MM— *Panama*

Sister Gerri Brake ministers to elderly Panamanians at the *Fundación Nueva Vida*—the **New Life Foundation**—that she founded in 1989 in the facilities of the former Howard Air Base. Sister Gerri knew of the challenges that poor seniors face and of the support they need when they face serious physical or cognitive problems. This is especially difficult when loved ones, who can give the daily love and support they need, are not nearby.

The New Life Foundation is a warm home with a welcoming spirit for all who live there. It can welcome up to 110 residents in both nursing and assisted living care, along with facilities for short-term medical recovery stays and for hospice care. Since most of the poor elderly would not be able to afford a place in a commercial nursing home or assisted living facility, the New Life Foundation

brings security with daily meals, health care and many other services so that all are able to maintain their health, dignity, and quality of life. The residents' senior years are passing in a much more positive direction than they would have without the Foundation.

"In May 2024 the Foundation celebrated its 34th anniversary in the service of the older adults," Sister Gerri says. "The moment allowed for us to remember the building blocks that sustained us through the years and to continue to dream for the future as we respond to the growing population of older adults in Panama."

It's a blessing for any missionary to be able to see first-hand the positive difference her work makes. **And it's a blessing to see the difference you make through your own caring and generosity! Thank you!**

Sister Rolande Pendeza Kahindo, MM–

East Timor



During the COVID-19 lockdown in Aileu, East Timor, our **Sister Rolande Pendeza Kahindo** offered her sewing, knitting, crocheting, and embroidery skills to help meet the critical need for personal protective equipment. Many Timorese women and schoolgirls were eager to help her and learn new skills that would benefit everyone. The masks they made for themselves, for patients at the nearby clinic and for the people in the remote villages “made God’s Love Visible” at a very critical time.

Sister Rolande realized that these new skills could also help the women and girls support themselves and their families by making and selling bags, earrings, hats, baby outfits, bracelets, belts, and sweaters in the markets. She began an educational training program called Suku Kreativu Group (Creative Knitters) to teach knitting, crocheting, and embroidery that would help them hone their skills with knitting needles, crochet hooks, looms, knitting machines, and sewing machines.

“The women are always proud to wear the sweaters they make with their hands,” Sister Rolande said. “When people ask if they ordered their sweaters from China, the women proudly respond, ‘We make these in East Timor!’”

In 2024, Saints Peter and Paul High School in Aileu invited Sister Rolande to extend her Suku Kreativu ministry to their campus. Having taught English there, she welcomed the opportunity to diversify the school’s traditional academic curriculum with hands-on extracurricular activities.

Through Sister Rolande’s creativity, women and young people are discovering that they, too, are co-workers with God, empowered to shape a better future for themselves.

Together, we are weaving lives of dignity and love not only for the people of East Timor, but for all creation. Thank you!

Sister Sue Glass, MM—

Hong Kong



The Maryknoll Sisters first went to China in 1921 as the first group of religious Sisters from the U.S. to undertake an overseas mission. Recognizing the need for education, Sister Mary Paul McKenna founded the Maryknoll Convent School as a kindergarten with 12 students! Sister Mary Paul and those early students could not have imagined what the school would look like a century later: there are now over 1,700 students from ages six to 18.

Sister Sue Glass was missioned to Hong Kong in 1980 when it was still a British colony, and has seen many changes over the years. She's an inspiring educator and brings her gifts to

the Maryknoll Convent School, where she engages with the students as a spiritual advisor.

She offers counseling, joins them in prayer, and conducts exercises to promote reflection, spirituality and team-building. "I have the same experience with the parents," she says. "Once a month we have a faith-sharing group. Our emphasis is going beyond borders, whether it be geographical or sociological, to go beyond yourself and do something that's outward looking."

Each moment brings many challenges and with the help of faithful supporters like you, the school, its students and the Sisters can continue to "make God's Love Visible" in this part of our world as we all journey into the future. **Thank you and God bless you!**

Sister Darlene Jacobs, MM

Q: Why did you become a Maryknoll Sister?

Giving

PLANNED AND LEGACY GIVING

Many of our supporters are looking for ways to make a major, impactful gift to Maryknoll Sisters ministries. We want to make sure that this can be done without causing financial hardship for the donor... and in some cases, even providing benefits.

Below, we present some options for giving that you may wish to consider.

Donor Advised Fund

A Donor Advised Fund is an account that is created and managed for the purpose of making charitable contributions. A charitable income tax deduction is allowed when the Fund is established and additional gifts to the Fund are made. Charitable gifts are made to qualified charitable organizations as directed by the donor.

Giving From An IRA

Tax laws allow a person at least 70 ½ years of age to make charitable gifts up to \$100,000 from their IRA account. There is no income tax due when

making this type of gift. There is no additional charitable tax deduction.

A Gift Of Stocks

Using long-term (held longer than one year) appreciated stocks is the most economical way to give. A donor is entitled to a charitable income tax deduction for the full fair market value of the securities up to 30% of the adjusted gross income. Excess deductions can be carried forward up to five additional tax years. You also avoid paying any capital gains tax on the appreciation. Charitable Gift Annuities

Many of our donors are continually searching for new methods of planned giving. A Charitable Gift Annuity with Maryknoll Sisters becomes an attractive way to fund a gift. A Charitable Gift Annuity can provide economic benefits to the donor and in turn will help ensure the mission of the Maryknoll Sisters.

A Charitable Gift Annuity is an irrevocable contract between you and the Maryknoll Sisters. You transfer cash or other assets, such

as securities, to us in exchange for guaranteed regular payments for life. The amount of each payment is determined by your age when the annuity is initially funded. (Refer to our website for gift annuity rates.) Married couples often choose to have two annuitants so both will enjoy payments for life. There is no limit to the number of annuities you can fund.

Cryptocurrency

Maryknoll Sisters have partnered with TheGivingBlock.com to ensure your safety, security and convenience. Donating a noncash asset like cryptocurrency is one of the most tax-efficient ways to support the important mission of the Maryknoll Sisters. Similarly to donating stocks, the simple process of donating in cryptocurrencies is beneficial to you and the Sisters! The gift is tax deductible at the full market value, but you owe no taxes on the assets you donate. We accept donations in Bitcoin, Ethereum, and over 80 additional leading cryptocurrencies. A Bequest Or Living Trust

A Bequest is a gift made through your will which takes effect at the time of your death. You can make a Bequest to the

Maryknoll Sisters in the form of a fixed amount, a percentage of your estate, or the remainder which represents the balance of your estate after all of the other bequests have been satisfied.

A Revocable Living Trust is created during one's life. Legal title of the assets is transferred to a trustee to manage the assets until the Trust is terminated. This usually occurs at the death of the grantor (person creating the trust). When the Trust terminates, the named beneficiaries receive their distributions. Using a Revocable Trust gives a person flexibility in estate planning and trust assets are not subject to probate.

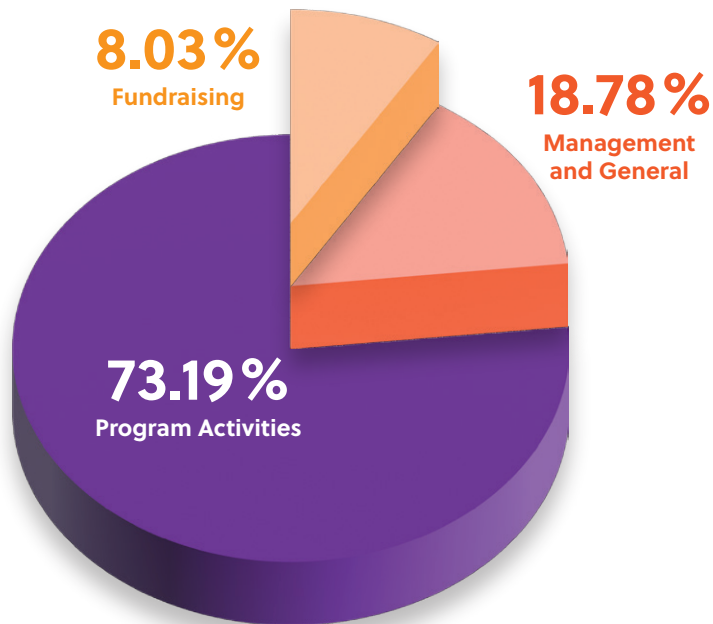
Fall Festival
